



# Enhancing the impact of the work of the Commission on the Status of Women Workshop/information sharing session

#### **Background and purpose**

The Commission on the Status of Women is the unchallenged leader on issues of gender equality and the empowerment of women at the global level. It is a deliberative, consensus-building and policymaking body that has one of the highest profiles of any of the intergovernmental bodies that meet at the United Nations. Recent sessions have added to the visibility of the Commission's work, and to the results achieved. They have demonstrated the effectiveness and strategic value of the Commission and its role in shaping the agenda for gender equality and women's empowerment. The Commission thus has a solid basis to further enhance the impact of its work.

Working methods play a significant role in enabling intergovernmental bodies to implement their mandates and achieve their objectives in an efficient and effective manner. They can contribute to enhancing many components of a session, including preparations, high-level engagement, inter-action with stakeholders, and scope and impact of outcomes and monitoring their implementation.

The effectiveness of their working methods is regularly the subject of discussion and action by intergovernmental bodies. The Commission on the Status of Women last updated its working methods in 2006, and confirmed those in 2009 (E/RES/2006/9 and E/RES/2009/15). The current working methods of the Commission on the Status of Women, and ways for enhancing the impact of its work were recently the subject of a report of the Secretary-General (E/CN.6/2014/14).

The Economic and Social Council leads the work of the United Nations system through its role as the central mechanism for coordination of the activities of the United Nations system and its specialized agencies and supervision of subsidiary bodies in the economic, social, environmental and related fields, and its effectiveness has been strengthened recently, including through new working methods (see A/RES/68/1). Other functional commissions, such as the Statistical Commission (E/CN.3/2014/3, and decision 45/102 on working methods of the Statistical Commission), have also given consideration to their working methods, including in response to GA resolution 68/1. The Commission for Social Development reviewed its working methods in 2013 and 2014 (E/RES/2014/3, see also the report of the Secretary-General in E/CN.5/2013/5).

As the international community is working towards the post-2015 development agenda and sustainable development goals, working methods can be a way for adapting to the new framework and ensuring that follow up and implementation are 'fit for purpose'.

## **Objective**

In order to support the Commission's consideration of its working methods, UN-Women is organizing a workshop to share information and discuss experiences and good practices in the use of working methods, from the ECOSOC system and beyond. It will also provide opportunity for stakeholders to discuss contributions to the work of the Commission.
